Message from Zoe Robinson, Board Chair

I first understood the value of Parachute because of Charlie.

Charlie was a player on my son's hockey team many years ago. Back then, he was 13-14 years old and a small guy. At that age, sizes are very different. One game, a player clearly 50 pounds heavier gave Charlie an open-ice hit and Charlie was flattened. He didn't pass out, but his bell was clearly rung.

I was the health and safety officer for the team, I worked in sport most of my career and I had been involved with Parachute concussion work in its early days. The concussion work Parachute had done really helped advise parents on what were the best things to do following a concussion.

In Charlie's case, following the on-ice hit, he couldn't sleep, he couldn't concentrate, and all the concussion symptoms started to become apparent. He was losing the ability to function in a regular life because he suffered a concussion playing hockey. And I thought, that's just awful.

What made me want to serve on the Parachute's board was seeing how concussion mismanagement can impact young people. And concussion is more than just in sports: it impacts daily life, family relationships, health: our work to prevent concussion is so important.

Parachute's work expands beyond concussion prevention, of course. I have always loved urban planning and the work Parachute does to promote Vision Zero and road safety to reduce crashes, make it safer for cycling and pedestrians, is brilliant. I'm in Toronto, where I now see buttressed corners, separated bike lanes and advance signals for pedestrians. Parachute has Influenced policymakers to get this stuff done.

Congratulations, Parachute, on a decade of leading injury prevention in Canada. I'm honoured to support our cause.

Message from Pamela Fuselli, President and CEO

This year, we celebrated Parachute's 10th anniversary as Canada's injury prevention charity. We recognized this milestone in a few ways that included our many and diverse network of individuals and organizations who are essential to our mission.

Parachute launched its first podcast, Popping the Bubble Wrap, with parents and experts talking about their concerns and approaches to safety to keep kids as safe as necessary. National Injury Prevention Day saw a record number of "light ups" across the country with 93 landmarks lighting up Parachute green to raise awareness of preventable injuries. Celebrities and supporters recorded messages for Parachute's 10th anniversary, including former Governor General David Johnston, Olympian Steve Podborski, Paralympian Cindy Ouellette, world-renowned neurosurgeon Dr. Charles Tator, and many more. After almost 10 years, Parachute along with co-hosts BC Injury Research and Prevention Unit and the BC Centres for Disease Control, presented the Canadian Injury Prevention Conference, held in Vancouver. The final consensus: we can't wait another decade to reconvene.

The work that Parachute does, bringing data and evidence of effective solutions together with our expertise in knowledge

translation, results in implementation of programs and campaigns, influencing policy change and sharing best practices with our partners. I am often asked how a Parachute, with a team of only 18 people, can produce the volume of such high-quality initiatives. The truth is that we have a huge family of partners who are as committed and passionate as the team at Parachute to making Canada the safest place at home, on the road and at play. Collaboration is baked into our DNA – we are stronger together. This not only includes those working in the field of injury prevention, but our funding partners who are a crucial part of the recipe for success.

Leading Parachute as its President and CEO for the past four years and as a senior leader for the past 10 years has been tremendously rewarding. The dedicated team at Parachute, present and past, have been able to create credible, timely, evidence-based initiatives that have built new knowledge and collaborations that make it possible to amplify our work, enabling Parachute and the network of injury prevention professionals to make change happen every day.

Celebrating 10 years

Parachute came into being in 2012, the result of an amalgamation of four charities to create a united, national voice for injury prevention in Canada.

In 2022, we took time to celebrate our accomplishments over the past decade with our team and supporters, culminating in the Canadian Injury Prevention Conference held in Vancouver Nov. 2 to 4, 2022

National Injury Prevention Day (NIPD)

Our sixth NIPD on July 5 garnered 33.4 million media impressions: Parachute staff did 21 interviews with CBC Radio / Radio-Canada morning shows; news outlets in Ontario and Alberta published stories about injury-prevention initiatives in those provinces, such as ATV safety best practices. Both Parachute and the Canadian Kinesiology Alliance issued news releases about NIPD, with the Alliance drawing attention to the fact that falls cause twice as many deaths among older adults than motor vehicle crashes. These releases drew another 61.4 million impressions.

As well, we had a record 93 light-ups of Canadian landmarks in Parachute "safety green" and Parachute's two NIPD hashtags, #ParachuteNIPD and #TurnSafetyOn, drew 5.6 million impressions on social media channels.

We launched the NIPD Hospital Challenge, where we invited hospitals across Canada to raise awareness about the importance of injury prevention to the health-care system and hosted a webinar on this topic. More than 40 hospitals and health units participated on social media, with 12 reporting additional activities held on site.

Canadian Injury Prevention Conference

Parachute co-hosted this event, the first national gathering of injury prevention professionals since 2013, with the BC Injury Research and Prevention Unit and the BC Centres for Disease Control. Held in Vancouver in November, keynote speakers were author and Globe and Mail health columnist <u>André Picard</u>, and Victoria B.C. emergency room physician <u>Dr. Frederick Voon</u>, author of Your Inside Guide to the Emergency Department, and How to Prevent Having to Go. Both challenged and inspired us to work with healthcare systems, governments and communities to make change.

Parachute's President and CEO **Pamela Fuselli** chaired two plenary panels and several Parachute staff presented during the conference on everything from our struggles with gathering data on injury, to campaigns to promote safe storage of cannabis edibles, to Vision Zero road safety and youth engagement.

Vision Zero

Under the Vision Zero framework, no death or serious injury is acceptable on our roads. Parachute, supported by our road safety partner **Desjardins Insurance**, leads Vision Zero initiatives in Canada. This year, we expanded our road safety work thanks to additional support from **Transport Canada** Enhanced Road Safety Transfer Payment Program.

Change for Good Roads

Parachute published <u>Change for Good Roads: an intersectoral</u> <u>approach to urban road safety</u>, the result of collaboration among 17 other Canadian organizations facilitated by **Impakt**, a social change organization. The report outlines how we can unify our efforts to create safe, active healthy and sustainable urban roads and communities.

Our collaborators included **880 Cities, Canadian Association** of Retired Persons, Canadian National Institute for the Blind, Green Communities Canada, Hidden Mobility Disability Alliance, ParticipACTION, Piétons Quebec, The Centre for Active Transportation, Velo Bikes as well as representatives from other road safety groups, the insurance industry and academia.

Share Safe Roads

Working with our agency of record, **Mass Minority**, Parachute developed the bilingual #ShareSafeRoads / #PartagerDesRoutesSûres campaign to highlight the importance of making our roads safe for all road users, not just those in cars.

Featuring the characters of Driver, Cyclist, Pedestrian and Scooter – all in a group therapy session with Counsellor – the campaign consisted of 30-second PSAs for broadcast and YouTube, as well as shorter vignettes promoted on TikTok, all of which drove traffic to our Vision Zero information page on parachute.ca. Thanks to **Bell Media** for donated PSA airtime, including a memorable play during the 2022 Superbowl.



Vision Zero resources

Parachute continued our popular webinar education series on Vision Zero, producing five in 2022 on the following topics:

- <u>Taking action: the Global Plan for the New</u> <u>Decade of Action for Road Safety 2021-2030</u>
- <u>Cycling in Canada: Pedalling toward sustainable</u> <u>climate action and Vision Zero</u>
- <u>The role of technology and data in Vision Zero</u> <u>interventions</u>
- <u>Vision Zero: The Next Generation</u>
- Equity in Vision Zero and road safety



We also published <u>Canadian Landscape 3.0</u>, which reviews Vision Zero commitments and actions underway in 22 Canadian jurisdictions and a further 12 communities where a Vision Zero road safety approach is being considered. In addition to a data and literature review, the landscape features interviews from 11 advocates working on the ground to embrace a systems approach to improve road safety and end road fatalities and serious injuries.



#CommitToAct

Parachute led advocacy in Canada to support the United Nations' #CommitToAct campaign, promoting the goals of the Global Decade of Action for Road Safety 2021-30. We reached out to governmental leaders across Canada to raise awareness and seek their support for the UN goals.



Canadian Youth Road Safety Council

Created under our For Young Drivers, By Young Drivers program, this council of 20 Canadian youth ages 15 to 24 formed in February 2022 and met monthly with Parachute staff to advise on the best approaches on engaging youth with road safety information. They also played a key role in shaping our approach for our National Teen Driver Safety Week in 2022.



Staff lead **Umayangga** Yogalingam also researched and wrote A framework for accelerating youth engagement in road safety, downloadable from our For Young Drivers, By Young Drivers program page. This report summarizes findings from a literature review and environmental scan on:

 factors that impact driving behaviour in young people



- youth engagement and partnership strategies in health promotion and injury prevention programming
- tools and platforms used to engage young people in health promotion and injury prevention programming.

National Teen Driver Safety Week

#DrivingTakes100

This year's NTDSW, with additional support from CN, focused on the issue of distracted driving among young drivers with the theme #DrivingTakes100 – 100 per cent concentration.









Canada's Favourite Crossing Guard

The 2022 Canada's Favourite Crossing Guard Contest drew 368 nominations for 29 crossing guards. Parachute launched this annual contest in 2005 to acknowledge the tremendous efforts of dynamic crossing guards who help keep our children safe. In 2022, we revived the contest after a pandemic shutdown, thanks to our exclusive road-safety partnership with Desjardins Insurance.

Carl Wright, Hillsdale Elementary school, Hillsdale, Ontario, runs a **blog** where he posts information on traffic and vehicle safety and shares his experiences as a crossing guard. He also spread awareness around World Car-Free Day among the Hillsdale community.

Networks and conferences

Parachute leads Vision Zero awareness and supports jurisdictions implementing this Safe System Approach to road safety. Key to this work is presenting to and interacting with road safety specialists at conferences and symposiums organized by organizations such as the Canadian Association of Road Safety Professionals, the National Association of City Transportation Officials and the Transportation Association of Canada. Parachute also produces a quarterly e-newsletter, Word on the Street, highlighting new Vision Zero resources produced by Parachute.

Vehicle-for-Hire Driver Training Program

Responding to a call from the City of Toronto, Parachute developed an online safety and equity training program for drivers of taxis, limousines, Ubers, Lyfts and other vehicles for hire that launched in fall 2022. The course is composed of five mandatory, self-paced, on-demand online modules covering:

- transporting passengers in a safe manner
- driving in an urban setting
- providing service to persons with disabilities
- providing service without discrimination
- understanding legal requirements

Following these modules, students then take a live online exam proctored through our partner, Globe Driving Academy, to receive the certificate required by the City of Toronto to get a vehicle-forhire licence.

Pan-Canadian Poison Centres Report

The Canadian Association of Poison Centres and Clinical Toxicology (CAPCCT), Health Canada and Parachute released the first <u>Pan-Canadian Poison Centres Annual Report</u> since 1987.

Poisoning, particularly unintentional poisoning, is a much larger public health issue in Canada than is generally recognized. Poisoning incidents cost the Canadian economy \$2.6 billion in a single year, including \$456 million in direct health-care system costs.

Canada's five poison centres operate 24/7 year-round to provide medical advice on poison exposures, managing more than 60 per cent of cases at the site of exposure, allowing patients to safely stay at home and outside of healthcare facilities. The 2020 Pan-Canadian Poison Centres Annual Report includes the most current data from all five of Canada's poison centres. The report provides an overview of the number and nature of cases managed by poison centres across Canada and highlights the role of these centres in poison prevention efforts.

#HighAndLocked cannabis safe storage campaign

With support from **Health Canada**, Parachute promoted safe storage of cannabis edibles in the home to prevent inadvertent exposure to children. While keeping the #HighAndLocked theme, we launched renewed creative by Mass Minority: a series of stills and 10-second videos showing adults in a family home setting putting away a locked medicine back "up high" – and inadvertently exposing their bellies when they did so.

The message: Put your hands in the air to keep your cannabis #HighAndLocked (en français, #EnHauteurEtVerrouille). The campaign ran in March on social media and on digital mall boards donated by **Branded Cities**, and again in December through social media. Total impressions: 108 million.

Parachute also shared information on the differences between legal and illegal cannabis to educate parents via a sponsored article in **Today's Parent**.







Poison prevention webinars

For the third year, with support from **Health Canada**, Parachute presented four webinars on poison prevention in 2022, focusing on <u>parental attitudes and behaviours around cannabis edibles</u>, <u>illegal cannabis edibles packaging</u>, <u>poisoning trends in Canada</u> and <u>effective health messaging</u>.

The first three webinars led up to Poison Prevention Week (March 20 to 26, 2022) with its 2022 theme of #CheckForPoisons.

With support from health partners and Canada's five regional poison centres, social posts sharing information on poison prevention reached 8.9 million impressions. Thanks to funding from Health Canada, we supported 13 community-based initiatives, with \$15,000 in grants distributed to eight community partners and we provided more than 2,800 cabinet locks and more than 300 lock bags to five additional communities, along with three in the grant program.

Fall prevention

Falls continue to be the No. 1 cause of injury deaths in Canada and cost the economy more than \$9 billion in direct costs to our health-care system.

Loop and Loop Junior

Through funding from the Ontario Ministry of Health, Parachute implements Loop and Loop Junior, two bilingual no-cost platforms that enable their members – the intermediaries who work with adults, older adults, caregivers and parents – to innovate, learn, share and implement fall prevention best and promising practices.

From October 2021 to September 2022 – the established reporting period for Loop prior to the program joining Parachute – there were more than 1,800 active Loop members, a 56-per-cent increase from 2021. The Loop newsletter has 3,537 subscribers, an increase of 370 subscribers since last year. Loop Junior focuses on child falls and has more than 400 active members.



We facilitated 14 webinars, 12 in English and two in French, on fall prevention topics, produced a new evidence summary on Wearable Devices for Fall Prevention and translated two earlier evidence summaries into French.



Fall Prevention Month

Fall Prevention Month, recognized by Health Canada, takes place in November and raises awareness about falls' devastating impact and provides evidence-based information on fall prevention across the lifespan.

The month has its own website, **fallpreventionmonth.ca**, that provides information and resources to organize and promote fall prevention activities and initiatives. The site had more than 112,000 visits in 2022.

New resources created for 2022 included an updated social media guide and graphics, new feature articles, an updated fact bank, fall prevention trivia cards and six short videos, featuring Stratford actor **Brian Tree**, demonstrating fall risks using an engaging "silent movie" style to attract attention to fall prevention messaging on social media and other channels. We shared the videos through targeted promotions on Facebook, which reached more than 130,000 older adults in Canada. Both the Parachute and Fall Prevention Month social accounts promoted fall prevention information throughout November, joined by partners across Canada, resulting in nearly five million impressions from 1,760 posts on Twitter.



For Seniors, By Seniors: Community Conversations

Through funding from the Government of Canada's New Horizons for Seniors Program, Parachute facilitated four free online Community Conversations where older adults could meet, discuss and hear from experts on fall prevention and aging in place in their communities.

The conversations covered how to adapt your home for healthy aging, getting and staying physically active, and supports and services to age in place.

This year's Safe Kids Week, held from May 30 to June 5, 2022, focused on promoting active and safe transportation. Parachute provided key messaging and activity guides for partners to use across Canada and hosted a webinar, Encouraging active transportation for children. Social mediposts with #WalkBikeAndWheel messaging earned 1.8 million impressions.

Elementary Road Safety

This program, funded by Aviva, provides intensive support for school communities to assess, identify and improve road safety in their school communities. Since the program's inception in 2019, 11 school communities in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Saskatchewan, worked with a Parachute staff advisor to install 48 built environment changes in their school zones. The first school in the program, St. Stephen School in Ottawa, completed the program this year and reports more than a 10-per-cent increase in the number of students who walk, bike, or scooter to school and more than a 10-per-cent decrease in the number of parents driving students to school.





Keeping kids safe in the early years: At home, at play and on the road

With support from the **Ontario Trillium Foundation**, Parachute reimagined its approach to reaching parents, families and communities in need through our Safety Education Program for Parents/Caregivers of Children Under 6.

We collaborated with community partners, including EarlyON centres that offer free services, resources and support to Ontario families with children up to age 6. Parachute developed new resources, a presentation and delivered six workshops (five in person, one online) to parents in Toronto's Neighbourhood Improvement Areas – neighbourhoods identified as facing inequities and in need of investment. Parachute distributed more than 4,700 copies of print resources in seven languages and more than 1,650 pieces of free home safety equipment to families in need.

Concussion

With easing of COVID-19-related travel restrictions in 2022, the sixth International **Consensus Conference on Concussion in** Sport took place in Amsterdam Oct. 27 to 29, 2022. Parachute's President and CEO Pamela Fuselli and Director of Knowledge Translation, Stephanie Cowle attended along with hundreds of delegates from around the world. The last concussion consensus statement was published in 2017 and Parachute will be working in 2023 to adapt our concussion materials to reflect any changes in consensus released that year, following the conference.

Support and awareness

Parachute continues to support sport organizations across Canada with training on concussion prevention, recognition and management and raise awareness across the country about concussion prevention, recognition and management.

- Supported the second Concussion Awareness Week in Canada with a social media campaign and two virtual presentations: Rowan's Law Day event in Ontario and Concussion Awareness Day event in Atlantic Canada.



Smart Hockey

With support from Scotiabank and in partnership with the BC Injury Research and Prevention Unit (BCIRPU), Parachute brought Smart Hockey to B.C. in 2022.

In previous years, the program had reached minor hockey leagues in Ontario, Alberta and New Brunswick, primarily consisting of male players. In 2022, Parachute worked closely with BCIRPU to distribute 23 physical Smart Hockey Concussion Kits to reach female athletes through the Tri Cities Female Ice Hockey Association (TCFIHA). The TCFIHA consists of female players aged 5 to 21 from Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam, Port Moody, Anmore and Belcarra, B.C.

Parachute and BCIRPU also hosted a virtual information session in November 2022 for TCFIHA's coaches and staff, providing an overview of the Smart Hockey Concussion Kit and relevant resources.

Our leadership and impact

- Parachute cultivated 508 opportunities with government at the federal, provincial/territorial, and municipal/regional levels and governments. They reached out to Parachute to advise on policies related to:
 - tobogganing safety (Coroner consultation related to a child's tobogganing death, to inform recommendations for City of Ottawa)
 - Ontario's building code regarding climbable guards (horizontal railings) and potential impact on children's safety
 - Cost of Injury methodology, presented to the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development Working Party on Consumer Product Safety, at the request of Health Canada
- Parachute co-authored eight peer-reviewed journal publications on subjects ranging from

support for women survivors of intimate partner violence and brain injury to the impact of built and social environment on child pedestrian and cycling injuries.

- Parachute collaborated with injury prevention, medicine, enforcement, industry, recreational rider associations, and provincial/territorial government staff to advocate for improvements to provincial and territorial all-terrain vehicle (ATV) legislation, based on 13 policy recommendations.
- As the Canadian NGO in the Global Alliance of NGOs for Road Safety, Parachute is helping lead the Global Decade of Action for Road Safety planning in North America.
- Parachute made Health Canada aware of regulatory changes introduced in the United States to strengthen safety standards for coin and button cell battery packaging (Reese's Law), prompting action by Health Canada to determine the impact of this change in Canada.
